### Physical Education

In PE this term, pupils have experienced a number of activities such as Football, Basketball, Volleyball, Swimming and Gymnastics. In National PE classes, pupils have focused on improving their Physical Fitness and the Emotional factor through Football and their Physical Skills and the Mental factor through Badminton. The Sports Leaders have gained valuable experience through delivering lessons to \$1 and hope to continue this in Primary Schools next term as part of a new Primary School transition programme. The PE department have also launched their new BGE levels assessment model and this will be used in the following term.

Extra-Curricular clubs have started up again and have seen a large number of pupils involved across 12 different clubs including Basketball, Netball, Cheerleading and Volleyball. A big thank you to all who have volunteered to run the variety of clubs on offer at St Thomas'. The S3 Football Team have begun playing fixtures and have had 2 positive results coming from 0-3 twice to draw 3-3.

Pupils have also accomplished a variety of achievements outside of School:

Hugo Boyle, Daniel Burns and Preston Kennedy (S2) won the Edinburgh Cup for Spartans Football Club in August, beating County Down 5-4 on penalties in the Final.

Kianna Coertze (S2) has been selected for the Scottish Swimming National Junior Team.

Louise Joyce (S2) represented Scotland at the Gymnastics British Classic Challenge Finals from 5th to 7th November. She competed in Floor, Beam, Bars and Vault, helping the Silver Team to 3rd place and winning the Bill McLoughlin Cup for Overall Team performance.

Martin Bienak (\$4) competed at the Judo British Championships on 4th and 5th December.

Evie Phillips (S4) has been selected for the Scotland U16 Girl Basketball squad.

Caitlin Milne (\$1) has achieved success with the U13 Spartans Girls football team, when they beat Hibs at Ainslie Park after extra time and penalties to win the league. Caitlin was the goalkeeper and was particularly pleased to make 3 saves during the penalty shootout to ensure success.

## History

4th year history went on an Edinburgh Book Trust trip around Edinburgh with Alex Wheatle, author of Cane Warriors.

Throughout this trip we learned about the importance of Black history within Edinburgh and learned about Alex Wheatle's life. Alex was sentenced to prison after the Brixton Riots in London. In prison he met a Rastafarian who taught him about the importance of reading books on Black History. On our trip, he read passages of his book, 'Cane Warriors', this was interesting to hear & as a group we are currently writing our book review on the book itself.

We heard stories about how the foundations of our city and how Edinburgh has been built up on enslaved people's money. This opened our eyes and we have had interesting discussions about how this history is important and should be included within schools today.

We learned about many Black people who lived within the city in Edinburgh who have been forgotten, including John Edmonstone. He taught Charles Darwin the art of taxidermy and in doing this contributed to science. However, his contribution is mostly overlooked.

It is important to continue having discussions about Black History and the importance of this in education.




## Support for Learning


### Show Racism the Red Card



During Anti bullying week, pupils were delivered a presentation on bullying. They subsequently discussed ways to be kind and supportive to each other as well as where to access support.






"Ask if someone's OK. Say you're sorry. Just say hey.

- Both events were celebrated on Friday breaktimes with a Kahoot quiz. Congratulations to our winners, Olivier \$2 and Juhi \$1.




## National Aids Day

Science Club

➤ This term, our \$1 Scientists have been attending Science Club on Thursday lunchtimes. They have carried out experiments to investigate the different flame colours created by metals, created their own lava lamps using common household items, investigated diffusion using skittles and even created their own Christmas decorations using invisible ink!



#### Mutations workshop for senior Biologists

Senior Biology classes have attended a workshop at the Royal College of Surgeon's where they studied mutations as part of their course. They even got to try out robotic surgical instruments. The picture is of a senior pupil using a Da Vinci surgeon console machine to practice their surgical skills - this is the only machine in the world that people, other than surgeons, can access to get a feel for what it takes (and St Thomas Biologists are some of the first to use it!).

Emily Broadwood (S5) commented: "I really enjoyed the trip. Getting to see specimens of mutations in real life is fascinating. It's been the best school trip I've been on".


#### Royal Christmas Biology Lecture

Advanced Higher Biology were invited to attend the College of Surgeon's Christmas lecture on December 1st to hear speaker Prof. Alan McNeill who is a consultant urological surgeon at Edinburgh's Western General Hospital. He is an expert in the field of surgical robotics to achieve minimal invasive surgery. The S6 pupils loved the experience!

#### Biology Daffodil project - sequencing the genome

The school if very fortunate to have been chosen to receive funding from the Royal Society to participate in a very special gene sequencing program. With support from scientists at the James Hutton Institute in Dundee and Dundee University, pupils will be using the latest technology to extract chloroplast DNA from very rare cultivars of daffodils. The data our pupils collect will then be used to sequence the genome and will help researchers. The technology the pupils will be using is called a MinION which uses nanopore technology. NASA have used this in the International Space Station to sequence DNA in space so we're being given the opportunity to use some very special pieces of equipment!

**On Wednesday the 10th of November** \$3 Computing students were involved in BIMA Digital Day.

They all got involved in a hands-on experience with digital professionals this year from Lloyds Banking group – who were absolutely amazing and helped all the students coming up with their own ideas as well as sharing their own journeys into Tech jobs. They are set a challenge of coming up with an innovative idea set by WWF to support climate change. On the 26<sup>th</sup> Nov Madame Jean Pierre, Mr Lodge, Mrs Hunter and Miss Stalker judged and the winning team was "EcoLocator" with team members Grace Beverage, Sadie Collier, Julia Broadwood and Erin McFeat. This teams idea was to create a website that suggests to users eco-friendly, cheaper and closer alternative locations to go on holiday too instead of more economically harmful, more expensive and further away places. The user would enter things they wanted on their holiday's e.g. beach, hot weather and it would find the closest place that meets this description.

The idea will now be put forward into a national schools competition and the winning idea will be created in partnership with the WWF. Good luck to our amazing winning team and thank you to all students involved.

#### **S4 Code Clan**



#### **S6 Tech Team**





S3 Pupils comments


"I enjoyed seeing the difference from my self-portrait in \$1, I can see how much I have progresses through the years."




### Textiles

S2: Little Textile group have been making a fabric organiser using the sewing machines. They have taken them home to give as presents.







- Over the last few weeks, Ms Kavak's \$2 class have been working with Ryan who has been teaching them creative writing techniques. They have been working together as a class to share their ideas on what makes the perfect creative story, working interactively to create different settings, characters and plots. Writer Ryan Van Winkle and illustrator Hailey Beavis were enthusiastic leaders in the workshops which combined words and pictures.

Susan Burdzinska writes: "This activity was fantastic! When the lesson started, we were already provided with all the materials needed and let our imagination run wild. Many magazines were handed out which contained pretty much everything: animals, planets, plants and more. Thousands of possibilities and ideas could be placed on a badge or just plain paper. After everyone completed their marvellous pieces of art it could be compressed and secured so you could admire your work forever. 

## Modern Languages



► This year all S3 language learners are preparing for an award which develop learners' language and employability skills, through studying a language in practical and relevant contexts for life and work. This qualification covers areas such as communication, self-awareness, confidence, employability, leadership and independent learning. Among the various activities for the award, pupils take part in a job interview and write their CV in the language they are learning.

## Modern Languages

- Students of Advanced Higher are celebrating the launch of a magazine written in the languages they study and published in collaboration with Edinburgh Napier University.
