At the start of term, senior pupils taking Business Management had the opportunity to visit Edinburgh Napier University to listen to talks from lecturers and business owners. The pupils went to Napier's Craiglockhart Campus and they really enjoyed seeing the university and attending a 'lecture' type conference. Speakers included the owner of 'The Little Parlour' ice cream shop in South Queensferry where the owner talked to the pupils about taking over a business during the Covid-19 Pandemic, with a focus on the challenges and successes that came from selling ice cream and coffees to locals during lockdown and subsequently after to tourists when normality returned, which created a substantially wider market. Thereafter pupils listened to talks from Invest2020 about jobs within the investment sector and from the Managing Director of Scottish Woman's Premier League which greatly inspired the pupils. The pupils then went into seminar rooms and completed a marketing task where they chose a business from the talks to promote and create an advertising campaign. The pupils really enjoyed the trip and were an asset to the school.



Higher Biology

Higher Biology pupils have visited the Surgeon's Hall Museum to study mutations as part of the first unit. They were given a workshop on the genetic source of mutations and then were shown real examples of body parts that illustrate the mutations they have been studying. These mutations included Patau's syndrome (which results in a body having one eye socket and a hole in the heart), Achondroplasia (a mutation which affects the growth of bones) and many more! This experience and the samples they studied are not available to the general public so this was such a unique and memorable experience for all.





Congratulations to our S6 MVP Mentors

MVP Overview:

S6 mentors have signed up to be part of the implementation of the MVP programme. Mentors in Violence Prevention (MVP) is a peer education programme providing young people with the language and framework to explore and challenge the attitudes, beliefs and cultural norms that underpin gender-based violence, bullying and other forms of abuse. S6 will now go in to S1-S2 classes and deliver lesson's relating to MVP topics.

Advanced Higher Biology lab skills development

Throughout the last month, Advanced Highers have been on an in depth lab skills topic looking at how scientists work in industry and the techniques they use.

Some equipment they've been using:

Agar plating, micropipettes and microbiology dilutions (growing yeast colonies at different concentrations)

Centrifugation to separate particles based on their density

Colorimeter to detect concentrations of unknown samples of solutions

Gel electrophoresis to catch criminals who have fled the scene of the crime!

Haemocytometers to conduct cell counts under a microscope

ELISA technique for identifying diseased individuals and the spread of infection using a colorimetric test


Complex statistical analysis and graphical representation of their results – including error bars, statistical significance and reliability/precision/accuracy

The ELISA experiment was done in conjunction with the company TimStar – our S6s used horse antibody to work out spread of infection. They discovered that our head boy was the original source of the "disease". Lucienne, our TimStar visitor, then gave them a STEM talk about career progression and laboratory work in the real world – she mentioned everything from the celebrities she's met, countries she'd worked in and even her discovery that supermarket meats were sometimes contaminated with harmful bacteria like E.Coli!

They have been the first pupils in Scotland to participate in this exciting opportunity to work in a stem cell laboratory. RoslinCT are an offshoot company from the Roslin Institute which cloned Dolly the sheep! They gained lots of experience in the real work setting of a laboratory and had a fantastic time.


Some of the pictures include microscopy of stem cells, suiting up to work in a clean room and general laboratory techniques for biotech industry!
































Science S2 Trip – Careers Hive


All S2 pupils attended the Careers Hive to talk to scientists working in STEM – they participated in skills workshops, interacted with equipment and attended a live Q and A session.

Some of the pictures include upside down concentration test, building engines, coding for robotics, 3D printing and satellite design.



In October, a speaker from Artmemis Funds, Mr Niznik came to speak to S4 pupils about Customer Satisfaction. He talked about the businesses and funds that he had managed over his career, such as Moonpig and his role in the company. He spoke about how to satisfy your target market to enhance sales and how to offer customers the highest quality service to encourage loyal customers who would repeatedly purchase the card design service. This really helped pupils prepare for their National 5 assignment which they will be starting in November.

Towards the end, pupils were able to ask the speaker questions, and these included any business related advice for the young people. In addition, they asked how the speaker chose his career path and how the business world had transformed mainly from technological advancements and innovations. The pupils really enjoyed Mr Niznik's talk and it generated many brilliant ideas for their upcoming assignment and classwork to work towards their National 5 qualification

They conducted a litter audit in the Meadows and will then produce a survey that they will use to ask members of the public their thoughts on littering in the Meadows. S3 Environmental Science trip


We had a fantastic day out got to hug a wind turbine, compete in a treasure hunt, figure out what type of blade is more efficient, and just spend great time together!

This experience was really helpful for pupils for after school when they enter the World of Work and exposed them to interview tips and how to decide and find out information on what career they may wish to explore after school. In addition, she gave the pupils a lot of interesting tips for all potential routes for after school such as apprenticeships, World of Work and college/university options. All the all, the pupils really enjoyed hearing about the recruitment and selection process.










Book Festival Trip



Ryan acted as a tour guide and brought pupils through the 'museum' which was dedicated to showing off the different features of their planet.

The week before the Christmas holidays, S3 pupils were very lucky to be visited by Josh from 'The Larder', a third sector organisation in West Lothian. The pupils learned about the aims of the organisation such as how it aims to fight poverty and hunger and its story, dating back to 2011 when it was founded. Afterwards, Josh showed the pupils the bakery shop, how it is run and where it is located and how these led to various prestigious awards such as the 'Social Enterprise Award' in Scotland. He then explained the impact on the local community of 'The Larder' through a Training Academy, their Catalyst Kitchen, their volunteers and partners and their overall success. Lastly, our speaker told pupils how they could be involved with third sector organisations such as 'The Larder' when they are older to help and give back to the community.





Before the end of term, another S3 class were very lucky to be visited by the social enterprise, 'Social Bite'. The speakers talked to pupils about the objectives of their organisation, by explaining how they are helping to end homelessness. The speaker showed the pupils where their shops are in Edinburgh and how they help people within the community by providing them with employment in their shops and then how this leads to helping to end homelessness. Thereafter, they spoke to the pupils about ways to be involved with Social Bite and how they could be apart of the social enterprise when they are older. It was a brilliant way to bring the theory and course content alive for pupils as they have been learning about the third sector in Business classes this term.




















Library

It has been busy time in the Library with various activities, clubs and an author visit.

In August S1 and S2 pupils had a trip to Edinburgh International Book Festival to attend Burning Bright: A Writer's Journey with S F Said. Some pupils also took part of online event with Nikesh Shukla. All pupils who took part received a free copy of "Tiger" by SF Said or "Stand up" by Nikesh Shukla.

In September some S6 pupils attended Advance Higher English workshop at Edinburgh University delivered by Robert O'Brien who is one of the Liaison Librarians. They also had a tour around the Main University Library. The same pupils also took part of an Advance Higher English workshop organised by the National Library of Scotland that also included a tour around the library. Pupils found both events very helpful and registered with both institutions as users. Both visits gave them knowledge and access to resources helpful with writing their dissertations as well as improved their research and bibliography writing skills.

In November we hosted a book writer Danielle Jawando presenting her latest book called "When Our Worlds Collided" to some S1 and S2 pupils as a part of Book Week Scotland. The event was very successful and pupils received a free copy of her book.

Our pupils have continued to be enthusiastic reviewers for 'Teen Titles' magazine –several contributed and their reviews have been already published with more awaiting of publication in future one.

Three library clubs were re-activated: Lego, Anime and S1-S2 Book Club. All run successfully and will be continued.

We also celebrated literacy events and run various activities with English S1 and S2 classes throughout the semester. Our new and big activities this semester were: Story Quest when pupils created and wrote stories together as part of Scottish Book Trust activity and Blessing Unicorn when pupil designed unicorns for an exhibition in the Central Library in March 2024.

At Cheerleading we work on perfecting dance routines, stunts, tumbling and working as a team.





Idea award S2 and S3 Computing Science






S2 Computing

S3 Computing




They have also been working on developing their understanding of computer security & precautions they should be taking.



At the end of the day, Cat Dalrymple (Interim Director of Justice for the Scottish Government) gave a powerful and inspiring closing speech about the current state of Scotland's Criminal Justice System. Overall, this was a fantastic day and gave our pupils much to think about!



On 25 November PE staff and pupils travelled down to watch the Manchester City v Liverpool game. Such an amazing experience for all those who participated.


















S4 Business Trip




Next week, we are looking forward to doing some carol singing on George Street to raise money for one of our favourite charities Children First before taking a well -earned break for the holidays.
